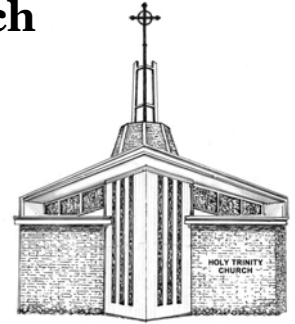

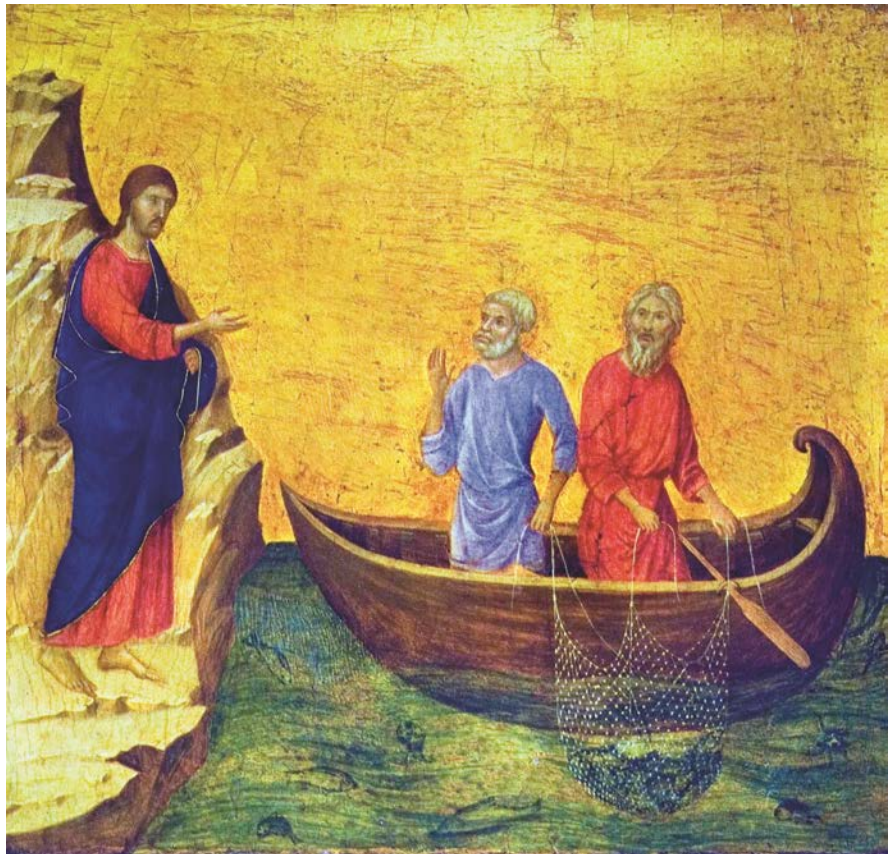

On February 9th, Deacon Andy Dunnam will present how the Sacrament of Matrimony and the unity of the family are under relentless attack – and have been for centuries. He will provide a look into the immense importance of Marriage Preparation and how we – as parents, relatives, and friends – can combat the current erosion of this divinely-established Covenant. Deacon Andy will also give insight into his new role in the Diocesan Marriage Tribunal. He will emphasize a crucial clarification that a Decree of Nullity is not a ‘Catholic divorce’ but a finding that a valid marriage never existed in the first place.

On February 16th, we will present a summary of Dr. Peter Kreeft's great book, *Prayer for Beginners*. He says the book is actually for anyone who isn't good at prayer, finds it hard to pray, or makes excuses not to pray!

Kreeft says prayer is more important than eating, since the soul is more important than the body. In fact, he says saints are never made except by prayer, “the hospital where we meet Dr. God!”

Join us to learn steps to follow, words to use, and ways to ‘make it work.’ Also learn the power of prayer – how even one moment of sincere prayer brings us closer to God than all the theology books in the world!

Catholic FYI

... why the emphasis on burying our dead? Because Christians have always had a great respect for the human body. We believe the body is sacred, because it was created by God as an act of pure love; it was washed in the sacred waters of baptism; and it was nourished time and time again by the sacred gift of the Holy Eucharist. The body is indeed holy, which is why Jesus never discarded His human body upon His death and Resurrection, but lifted it up to the glory of heaven, where His sacred body (His humanity) is forever united to His divinity. To make jewelry out of the ashes of our loved ones, to scatter them on the waters or on the land, or to keep them on the mantle of the living room is not in line with Christian tradition. It demeans the body, for it treats it like a mere commodity, to be used and manipulated in ways to bring some degree of consolation. We must instead bury our dead, because in doing so, we are honoring them, the temple of God's dwelling that they were on earth. We are also making a statement of profound faith and hope: my loved one, buried like Christ, is also called to share in His Resurrection. Love demands that we let the faithful departed go in peace, knowing that we will see them again in the glory of God's Kingdom.
