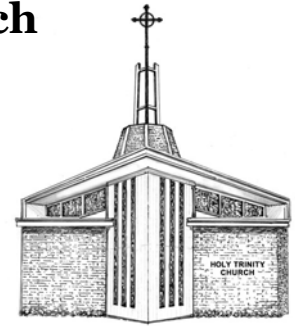

REFRESH YOUR FAITH!!!

On **January 21st**, we will begin our study of the Sacraments which, as the Baltimore Catechism said, are “outward signs instituted by Christ to give grace.” But we will learn that the sacramental dimensions are much wider and deeper than that one sentence.



Beginning with a brief, general introduction, we will then turn to two Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism and Confirmation. We will explain their characteristics and Biblical bases; discuss their effects; learn water’s symbolism in the Old and New Testaments; and highlight how the grace of Confirmation completes the grace of Baptism, empowering us to witness to Christ.

On **January 28th**, we will complete our study of the Sacraments of Initiation with the Eucharist – “the source and summit of the Christian life.” [CCC 1324] We will explore the typology (foreshadowing) of the Eucharist in the Old Testament; the Eucharist’s role in God’s Plan of Salvation; and the doctrines of the Real Presence and Transubstantiation. We will also discuss why receiving Christ’s Body and Blood is limited to Catholics...and only those Catholics in state of grace.

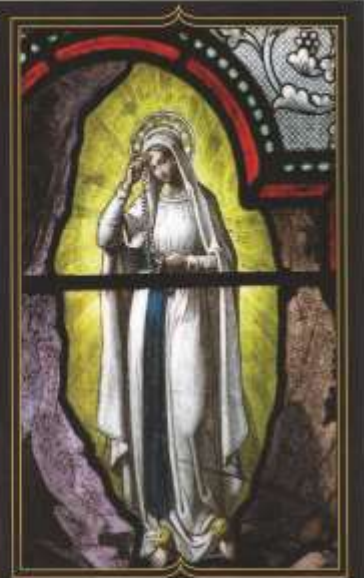

Adult Catholic Studies

On **January 21st**, we will cover chapters 1 through 3 of the Book of Revelation. Looking at John’s exile on Patmos, we will discuss his encounter with the angel who commissions him to record his forthcoming visions because “the time is near.”



The angel commands John to write to seven churches in Asia to comfort those who are suffering, correct those who are straying, and encourage all to persevere in the faith and ultimately conquer. We will also explain how those long-ago letters were also intended for the universal Church thereafter.

On **January 28th**, we see Jesus summoning John to Heaven where God, enthroned, is being worshiped. John’s witness of the heavenly liturgy inspired the celebration of the Mass in the early Church.

John sees the slain Lamb through whom God’s plan of salvation will be revealed and accomplished. He also senses that no one is worthy to open the scroll of God’s plan, sealed with seven seals. But John is about to see “what is to take place hereafter.”

Veiling of the Altar, the Chalice and the Tabernacle
In the Old Testament the Holy of Holies was veiled. This is where our tradition of veiling Holy things began. Hebrews 9:1-8

...the tabernacle which is called the Holy of Holies: Having a golden censer and the ark of the testament covered about on every part with gold, in which was a golden pot that had manna and the rod of Aaron that had blossomed and the tables of the testament. And over it were the cherubims of glory overshadowing the propitiatory: of which it is not needful to speak now particularly. Now these things being thus ordered, into the first tabernacle, the priests indeed always entered, accomplishing the offices of sacrifices. But into the second, the high priest alone, once a year: not without blood, which he offereth for his own and the people's ignorance: The Holy Ghost signifying this: That the way into the Holies was not yet made manifest, whilst the former tabernacle was yet standing.

...The Ark of the Old Covenant was kept in the veiled Holy of Holies. And at Mass, what is kept veiled until the Offertory? The Chalice. The most recent General instruction of the Roman Missal states that "it is a praiseworthy practice for the chalice to be covered with a veil. (GIRM #118.)

And, between Masses, what is veiled? The Tabernacle, the vessel which holds the very Body of Christ. These vessels of life are veiled because they are sacred and holy! The Church stipulates that the primary way of indicating the presence of the Blessed Sacrament in the Tabernacle is by veiling it. The presence of the Eucharist in the tabernacle is to be shown by a veil or in another suitable way determined by the competent authority. (Roman Ritual: Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist outside of Mass, 11).

The Altar likewise must always be covered (GIRM#297), with the exception of when it is stripped after the Mass of Holy Thursday.

We should not be surprised, therefore, to find that the importance of the sacred was reaffirmed in the "Third Instruction on the Correct Implementation of the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy" which states: "Liturgical reform is not synonymous with so-called desacralization and should not be the occasion for what is called the secularization of the world. Thus the liturgical rites must retain a dignified and sacred character." The difficulty is that when the sacred mysteries are unveiled, they lose their sacred character. Tradition teaches us that "a mystery—the tremendous—in order to be a mystery, needs to be hidden, so that we may long for it to be revealed."

Indulgence

Catholics will be able to receive a plenary indulgence through February 2nd, 2024, the feast of the Presentation in the Temple of Our Lord Jesus Christ, by praying before a Nativity scene in a Franciscan church.

This year marks the 800th anniversary of the first live Christmas crib and Nativity scene in the Italian town of Greccio, December 24th, 2023. In celebration and gratitude for this Christmas tradition for 800 years, the Church has granted to all Franciscan churches the wonderful grace of this indulgence. As a reminder, a plenary indulgence cleanses a person of all temporal punishment due to sin, under these conditions:

1. A detachment from all sin, including venial sin.
2. A visit to the Church (in this case the Nativity scene in a Franciscan church) with prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father.
3. Sacramental Confession and Holy Communion within 20 days before or after the visit.

The Catholic Center at the Citadel will have a nativity scene up until - February 2, 2024.

The indulgence also applies to visiting the nativity scenes at St. Francis of Assisi parish in Colorado Springs or Castle Rock.

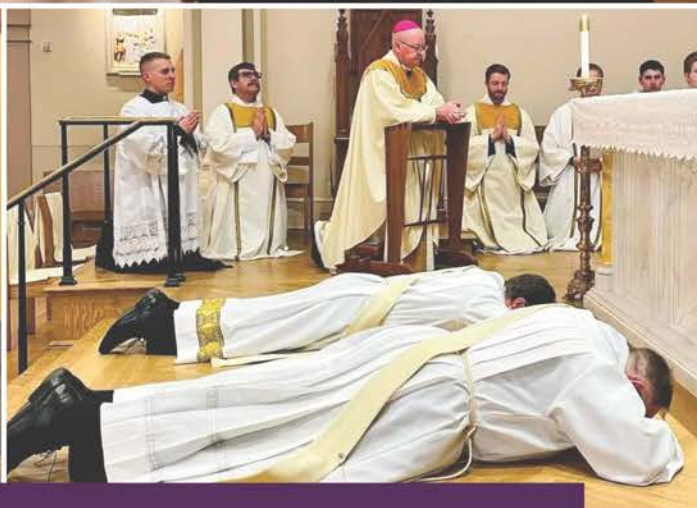
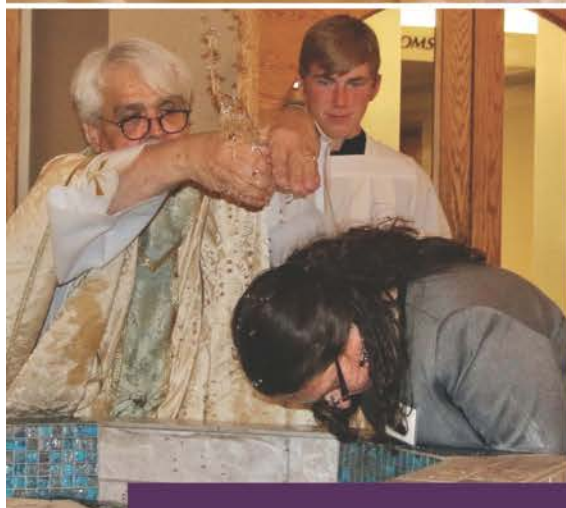
