

Catholic FYI

What happens when a Bishop is moved? And what changes?

When an episcopal see becomes vacant, a new diocesan bishop is chosen by the Pope. This can take some time. Currently, there are 6 Dioceses without bishops. One has been vacant since September 2023.

Each diocese has a college of consultors, which is composed of between six and twelve diocesan priests chosen by the bishop for a five-year term. The college meets after the episcopal see becomes vacant in order to elect a diocesan administrator. This administrator then takes charge of the diocese until the Pope names a new bishop. However, the Pope can name an administrator himself. If the Pope does this, he is known as an apostolic administrator. His function is the same as that of a diocesan administrator elected by the college of consultors.

A diocesan administrator has the power of a diocesan bishop, excluding those matters which are excepted by the very nature or by the law itself. He cannot make major personnel changes. He cannot remove the Judicial Vicar or Chancellor, he cannot name new pastors of parishes, the diocese should sort of run in a routine, ordinary way, sort of on “auto-pilot”.

Sharing Water with Cattle

“Water for Life” allows our parish to live the Lenten pillars of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to change lives. The alms collected will bring clean, safe water systems to remote villages where families currently must rely on contaminated rivers, streams, and hand-dug pits. A new well built by Cross Catholic Outreach provides water for 400 families. And 100% of donations go to building wells (0% administrative costs).

Maritina is careful as she collects her family's drinking water. After all, cattle are grazing beside her, and they drink from this pit too. After reaching down and filling a container with murky water, the teenager from Zambia scoops off the debris floating on top and tosses it aside. Then she pours the remaining water into a large bucket and reaches for another scoop. When she's back home, she prays for an end to this worrisome chore. Your Lenten alms will help Church missions bring clean water — and hope — to villages in Africa.

Diocesan Ministry Appeal

If we think the devil is a make-believe “boogie man,” a comical cartoon villain who whispers into our left ear while angels whisper into our right, then the Gospel dispels this notion. The devil exists. He is crafty (he quotes Scripture to Jesus). He is persistent (he tries three times to get Jesus to bow to him). He can subtly lead us down seemingly harmless paths with small sins the white lie here, the flash of anger there. He can also launch aggressive assaults when we are weak and vulnerable.

He tries this with Jesus, who was susceptible after 40 days of isolation, prayer, and fasting. Fully human, Jesus understands our weakness. He was born and baptized as we were born and baptized. He grew up, like all of us do. He learned a trade from Joseph, just as our parents have taught us important lessons. And like us, he is tested by Satan. But he is not tempted. That is the difference. Our Lord never strays from the Father's plan for him, not with the devil in the desert and not with his crucifixion at Calvary.

This Lent, let us remain ever vigilant to the devil's attempts to draw us away from God. Let us explore different ways to pray, perhaps saying the rosary on our evening walk. In addition to observing Friday's abstinence from meat, we can fast from criticizing others. And supporting the Diocesan Ministry Appeal almsgiving is a powerful way to share our blessings with those in need.



In *Foretold: Finding Hope in God's Providence*, Dr. Sean Innerst weaves together twelve pivotal Old and New Testament stories, showing how what was promised in the first part of our biblical history came to pass through Jesus, His apostles, and the Church. 
