

In *Foretold: Finding Hope in God's Providence*, Dr. Sean Innerst weaves together twelve pivotal Old and New Testament stories, showing how what was promised in the first part of our biblical history came to pass through Jesus, His apostles, and the Church. As he says, we can trust that the Divine Providence, so evident in Scripture, is also working in our lives today.

As we near the end of Lent, Connie Pratt will lead us in a study of the Shroud of Turin – the mysterious and miraculous linen relic many believe is Christ's burial and resurrection cloth. After detailing problems with the Carbon-14 dating which supposedly disproved the Shroud's authenticity, we will explore compelling evidence from history, tradition, iconography, textile study, metallurgy, botany...and the Bible itself.

## Food for Lent

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday for all those who have celebrated their 18th birthday and have not yet celebrated their 60th birthday. Fasting means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller, meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but they should not together equal the one full meal. Eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence from meat is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent by all who have celebrated their 14th birthday. Invalids, pregnant and nursing mothers are exempt.

On those days of fasting and abstinence, meatless soup is traditional. Sundays, of course, are always free of fasting and abstinence; even in the heart of Lent, Sundays are about the glorious Resurrection. This pattern of fasting and abstinence ends after the Vigil Mass of Holy Saturday.

As to special Lenten foods, vegetables, seafood, salads, pastas, and beans mark the season, in addition to the meatless soups. The fasting of this time once even precluded the eating of eggs and fats, so the chewy pretzel became the bread and symbol of the times. They'd always been a Christian food, ever since Roman times, their very shape being the creation of monks. The three holes represent the Holy Trinity, and the twists of the dough represent the arms of someone praying. In fact, the word "pretzel" is a German word deriving ultimately from the Latin "bracellae," meaning "little arms" (the Vatican has the oldest known representation of a pretzel, found on a 5th c. manuscript).

## Diocesan Ministry Appeal

We live in one of the wealthiest nations in one of the most prosperous times in the history of the world. Our life is full of convenience and time for leisure. We flip a switch, and a room is illuminated. We can satiate our hunger quickly by popping food in a microwave or hitting a drive-thru on the way home from work. Need water? Turn on the tap. There's no need to go to the well. But we are afflicted with a different kind of poverty, a poverty of spirit.

Good thing for Samaritan woman that she didn't live in our time, or she might have missed her chance for redemption. Jesus speaking to her, let alone asking her for a drink, is unheard of. Samaritans are considered "less than" and not worthy of interaction. But he goes even further. When she says the Messiah is coming, Jesus reveals himself to her: "I am he, the one who is speaking with you." His message is received, and believed, and her life is changed forever. With Jesus, no one is outside the fold—not even Samaritans—and no one is beyond redemption—not even the gravest sinner.

Are our priorities bringing us closer to Our Lord? Are we living according to God's plan for us? Are we filling our "bucket" with Christ? As his disciples, we are called to live with heaven in mind, and we are also called to bring as many people as we can with us! The programs and ministries that the Diocesan Ministry Appeal support unite people with Our Lord. This Lent, please consider the DMA as a way of giving alms.

## From the Pastor

In today's cultural moral wasteland, it is quite unpopular to even speak of sin, never mind condemn it. But that is exactly what the story of Noah and the flood is all about, as we are reminded by the scripture readings for the first Sunday in Lent. The great flood is a testament to God's hatred of sin and determination to wipe it from the face of the earth. He of course offers a way to escape the waters of destruction. He instructs Noah to build an ark which carries to safety eight people and a pair of every animal. With these, He provides the earth and the human race with a new beginning. As a sign of God's covenant of friendship with the newly recreated world, He places a rainbow in the sky. From the beginning, Christians have seen in this story a hint of a greater work of God that would come later. The first flood swept away the evil from the surface of the earth, but not from the hearts of the ark's passengers. The Red Sea closing in upon Pharaoh and his armies had much the same limitation—it did not cleanse the soul of Israel. An even greater act of salvation was needed, one that was more radical, that penetrated to the very "root" of evil. God himself enters into our world in the form of a man, and engages in hand-to-hand combat with the father of lies. First Jesus Himself is immersed in the waters, a sign of the destruction of sin, though He Himself has no sin. Next, He goes into the wilderness to strike at sin's agent. The wrestling match is won by the Son. This, however, is not the decisive battle. Mark is a gospel of few words and does not relate what Luke (4:13) tells us: Satan left Jesus to await another opportunity. That opportunity came later, brokered by Judas, Caiaphas, and Pilate. By means of the cross, the sign of this New Covenant, Jesus decisively vanquished sin and its patron, letting loose from His pierced side a stream that was more powerful than the ancient waters traversed by Noah and Moses. Through faith and immersion in these mighty waters of baptism, sin can finally be scourged not just from the skin but from the heart, putting to death not men, but the old humanity, separated from God and infected with the disease of disobedience. The first Letter of Peter (3:20) points out something that we can easily miss, that there happened to be 8 persons in the ark. Jesus rose from the day after the Sabbath, the "Eighth Day." God created the old world in six days, rested on the seventh, and performed the new creation on the eighth. For this reason, in the early Church, baptisms did not usually take place inside the main church sanctuary. Rather, smaller buildings called baptistries were erected next door to the church. It is notably that they were generally octagonal-eight-sided. Why? Because baptism means burying the old man with Christ and emerging from the womb of the Church as a new creation, sharing in Christ's resurrection.

Lent is a time intimately linked with baptism. In the early Church, it was the season that catechumens prepared themselves through the Scrutiny's, prayer and fasting for their paschal journey to the baptistry. The faithful prayed and fasted with them. It was also the time that those who had soiled the white garments of their baptism through sin prepared for reconciliation during the sacred Triduum. So let us determine through prayer, fasting, and giving to root out lukewarmness and compromise from our own hearts. Procrastination and excuses must come to an end. Now is the acceptable time, now the day of salvation!

God's many graces to all of you during this season of Lent.


