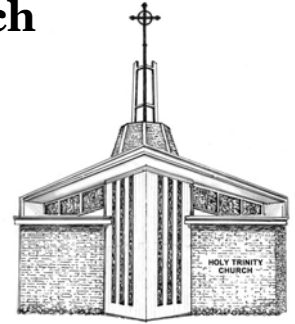

Eternal Father, we lift up these priests, deacons, and seminarians of our Diocese. Sanctify them, protect and guide them, and mold them into the likeness and holiness of Your Son, Jesus, the Eternal High Priest. May their lives be pleasing to You. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

In today's cultural moral wasteland, it is quite unpopular to even speak of sin, never mind condemn it.

But that is exactly what the story of Noah and the flood is all about, as we are reminded by the scripture readings for the first Sunday in Lent. The great flood is a testament to God's hatred of sin and determination to wipe it from the face of the earth. He of course offers a way to escape the waters of destruction. He instructs Noah to build an ark which carries to safety eight people and a pair of every animal. With these, He provides the earth and the human race with a new beginning. As a sign of God's covenant of friendship with the newly recreated world, He places a rainbow in the sky.

From the beginning, Christians have seen in this story a hint of a greater work of God that would come later. The first flood swept away the evil from the surface of the earth, but not from the hearts of the ark's passengers. The Red Sea closing in upon Pharaoh and his armies had much the same limitation—it did not cleanse the soul of Israel.

An even greater act of salvation was needed, one that was more radical, that penetrated to the very "root" of evil. God himself enters into our world in the form of a man, and engages in hand-to-hand combat with the father of lies. First Jesus Himself is immersed in the waters, a sign of the destruction of sin, though He Himself has no sin. Next, He goes into the wilderness to strike at sin's agent.

The wrestling match is won by the Son. This, however, is not the decisive battle. Mark is a gospel of few words and does not relate what Luke (4;13) tells us: Satan left Jesus to await another opportunity. That opportunity came later, brokered by Judas, Caiphas, and Pilate. By means of the cross, the sign of this New Covenant, Jesus decisively vanquished sin and its patron, letting loose from His pierced side a stream that was more powerful than the ancient waters traversed by Noah and Moses. Through faith and immersion in these mighty waters of baptism, sin can finally be scourged not just from the skin but from the heart, putting to death not men, but the old humanity, separated from God and infected with the disease of disobedience. The first Letter of Peter (3:20) points out something that we can easily miss, that there happened to be 8 persons in the ark. Jesus rose from the day after the Sabbath, the "Eighth Day." God created the old world in six days, rested on the seventh, and performed the new creation on the eighth. For this reason, in the early Church, baptisms did not usually take place inside the main church sanctuary. Rather, smaller buildings called baptistries were erected next door to the church. It is notably that they were generally octagonal- eight-sided. Why? Because baptism means burying the old man with Christ and emerging from the womb of the Church as a new creation, sharing in Christ's resurrection.

Lent is a time intimately linked with baptism. In the early Church, it was the season that catechumens prepared themselves through the Scrutiny's, prayer and fasting for their paschal journey to the baptism. The faithful prayed and fasted with them. It was also the time that those who had soiled the white garments of their baptism through sin prepared for reconciliation during the sacred Triduum.

Adult Catholic Studies

On **March 2nd**, we will present Dr. Brant Pitre's Purgatory and Prayers for the Dead. Purgatory and praying for the dead are two misunderstood, controversial elements of our Faith.



Interestingly, many Catholics do not fully understand the biblical and rational basis for either Purgatory or praying for the dead. And most non-Catholics reject both, primarily because they reject key books of the Bible and cling to sola scriptura. They dismiss the reality and reason for Purgatory, Sacred Scripture clearly points us to it – and the Church recognizes it as God's last great act of mercy.

In this video from his Why We Believe series, Dr. Brant Pitre discusses the Biblical basis for, and compelling reasons behind, these consoling teachings. Join us as we learn what Purgatory is, why it exists, and how we can help hasten the journey to heaven for its many residents, including our deceased loved ones.

On **March 9th**, we will begin our Lenten series: **The Bible and the Sacraments and Divine Mercy**.

In The Bible and the Sacraments, Matthew Leonard explores the deeper meaning and mystery of the sacraments – the “powers that come forth” from the body of Christ. After discussing the origins of the sacraments so richly revealed in the Old and New Testaments, Leonard provides two additional classes on Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick.

In anticipation of Divine Mercy Sunday, we will discuss the devotions and the special indulgence which Jesus, our Divine Mercy, gave us through St. Faustina. Our upcoming Adult Catholic Studies classes:

This Lent, we have some post cards available to share with those who may not have been attending Mass or may need to hear that you are praying for them.

Offer prayers and penances for a specific person. Plan ahead and put it on your daily calendar so you don't forget. Then, mail that person a beautiful postcard. Not only will this be incredibly touching, but this postcard can be hung on the fridge, added to a prayer card collection, or used as a bookmark.

Some Benefits:

Prayer: First, it encourages you to take the Lenten pillar of prayer even more seriously, focusing on how your prayer not only impacts your own spiritual life, but impacts the Body of Christ.

Companionship: Second, it allows you to become a sort of spiritual companion to another person on their own Lenten journey, particularly by letting them know that you are interceding for him or her on that day.

Promises: Finally, it gives you a chance to catch up on your 'I'll be praying for you' promises. It's easy to tell people that we are praying for them, but sometimes, our prayer for them just isn't as frequent or as deep as we would like it to be. Other times, we forget to pray altogether! This Lenten prayer activity changes that. You devote an entire day of spiritual focus — through prayer, but also sacrifice — to one person and their struggles, hopes, spiritual life, family relations, health, and whatever else that soul uniquely needs from you and your intercession."

Much more information will be available in the coming weeks. Holy Trinity will be doing "Water for Life" for our almsgiving this year. We hope you will join us.

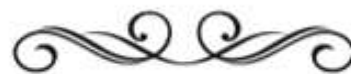
