Sacraments

Baptisms: Baptism preparation class is required for all parents and godparents, and they must be registered in a Catholic parish and members in good standing.

Contact the parish office to schedule an appointment.

Marriage: All engaged couples participate in a Marriage Preparation Program (a policy of the Diocese of Colorado Springs), Contact the parish office AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN ADVANCE of your planned marriage to begin preparation.

Sacrament of the Sick/Emergencies: Dial 633-2132, x1002. Calls are monitored on a regular basis.

Funerals: Please call the parish office **before** scheduling date and time with a funeral home. The parish office schedules presiders, musicians, and servers in consultation with family members.

Adult Catholic Studies

On May 21st, we'll meet Basil who, thanks to his 'Ivy League' education, became the doctrinal and theological expert for Bishop Eusebius and later succeeded him. We'll learn about the "new city" (hospital, soup kitchen, poor house, trade school, hospice) he set up to help the needy.



We'll find that John Chrysostom didn't just teach a theology on marriage but also condemned the sins which make us unworthy of the life flowing from that sacrament.

We'll hear about Nero, the murderous deviant who burned Rome but said the Christians caused it by their 'hate speech.' We'll learn about the martyrdom which followed...and see how these saintly people drew strength from, and identified with, the Eucharist as sacrifice.

On May 28th, we present our last class before summer, an especially-beautiful episode, "Living the Mysteries." We begin with St. Justin, who first tried to find peace in secular philosophies. But one day, an old man on the beach told him to seek wisdom in the Hebrew prophets. Thanks to those writings and brave Christian witnesses, he converted...and was eventually martyred himself.

We learn Christians likened Jesus' total gift of self in the Eucharist to man's total gift of self in martyrdom, considering them, in a way, as private and public liturgies.

As Christianity spread, 'red' martyrdom decreased. But as St. Jerome said, "there is always martyrdom," the need to offer ourselves up to God.

In the Mass, there is an anamnesis, a 'making present,' of the crucifixion. And we, as Christ's brothers and sisters, are called to accept His Cross and our own quiet martyrdom. We are to place our lives on the altar.

If we do so, we become "the Mass in motion." After all, by "living the mysteries" as the martyrs did, we are a kind of sacrament, a visible sign of who we are in Christ!

After Walk - Vendor Fair and Kid's Zone

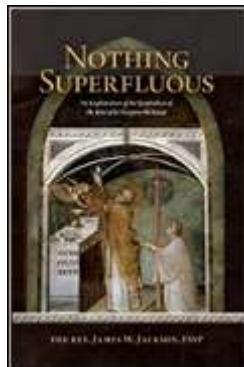
The goal of the Walk for Life is to raise funds for the ministry of Life Network, educate community members about Life Network and its outreaches and make a strong life-affirming statement to our community.

Catholic FYI

Like Mass, Adoration isn't necessarily about what we will get out of it. True, the graces dispensed by God help us grow in holiness, but the primary purpose of Adoration is right there in the name of the act: to adore the One present to us in the Eucharist.

Just be

Remember that you don't actually have to do anything. The Catholic faith recognizes that the greatest gift God gives us is Himself, and Adoration is another way for us to recognize that gift outside of receiving the Eucharist at Mass. So, don't overthink it. Just receive the gift.

Pray (with a little help)

If it's been awhile since you've entered the Adoration chapel and you're worried you might be a little bored (that's understandable!), or you have no idea where to start (it's okay!), ...

Pray the rosary. To contemplate the mysteries of Jesus' life in the rosary is to contemplate the mystery of the Eucharist given to us and the Blessed Sacrament we praise in Adoration. So, pairing these prayers is a great habit to get into.

Write in your prayer journal. Writing in a prayer journal is a great way of making your relationship with God seem more tangible, since we're getting the words out of our heads and onto the paper. Think of the practice as writing a letter to God. Take all your worries of the day and lay them down during Adoration. Or write to Him about everything that's going well in your life right now.

..Read. While Adoration isn't really the time to break out that thriller you've been working your way through, it is a great opportunity to pull out a book by one of the saints such as "The Diary of St. Faustina," St. Francis De Sales' "Introduction to the Devout Life," or St. Thérèse's autobiography "The Story of a Soul." Or prayerfully consider a few lines of the Catechism. You may also choose to read a set of devotional essays like Caryll Houselander's "The Reed of God," which is full of meditations on Mary. Of course, don't forget the Bible!

You don't have to sit still during your Holy Hour in order to make it count. It's okay for it to be a natural extension of the rest of your prayer life. So, if there's something that really helps you focus your prayer, bring it to Adoration. Most of all, remember to receive the gift of Christ in the Eucharist and just be present to God.



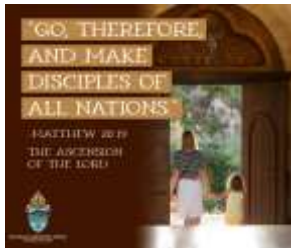
